The MCCSC Office of High Ability Education has begun the middle school high ability identification/application process for the 2019-2020 school year for incoming seventh grade students. Notification letters will be mailed on Friday, January 25, 2019 to current sixth grade students who automatically qualify for middle school high ability services (advanced ELA or ALPS) based on scores on the In View and NWEA assessments. Application materials for students who want to appeal for placement in middle school high ability programs are due to the Office of High Ability Education on or before Friday, February 8, 2019. Placement in advanced math classes is a separate process and will occur late second semester.

If you have questions about the application/identification process, a parent information meeting will be held on Thursday, January 24 at 6:30 P.M. in the Tri North Middle School auditorium. This meeting is open to any parent or student interested in MCCSC middle school high ability programs. Social Skill for the Week of January 28th

It is important for children to learn early on the social skill of respectful behavior by using kind words and actions toward others, asking for permission to use something that doesn't belong to them, and taking care of their belongings. Children can practice these skills at home with parents. If children are not showing respectful behavior, parents can review the skill steps with their children and talk with them about the importance of respectful behavior.

Showing Respect

- Obey a request to stop a negative behavior
- Do not tease, threaten, or make fun of others
- Allow others to have their privacy
- Obtain permission before using another person's property
- Do not damage or vandalize public property
- Do not persuade others into breaking rules
